Candidate information and how to vote

Introduction

On Thursday 4 May 2017, the voters of Greater Manchester will elect a Mayor for the first time.

People who are registered to vote in Bolton, Bury, Manchester, Oldham, Rochdale, Salford, Stockport, Tameside, Trafford and Wigan are able to vote in this election.

The Combined Authority Returning Officer is required by law to send a copy of this candidate information booklet to every registered voter in Greater Manchester. The booklet contains:

- a list of every candidate standing in the election in alphabetical order
- information about the Mayor of Greater Manchester and how the Mayor will be elected
- information on how to complete your ballot paper, how you can vote and what to expect at your polling station
- an Election Address from each of the candidates who have opted to be included in this booklet.

The Mayor of Greater Manchester

What will the Mayor of Greater Manchester do?

The Greater Manchester Combined Authority (GMCA) was established in 2011 and is made up of the ten Greater Manchester councils. Since June 2015, there has been an Interim Mayor, who has acted as the GMCA's eleventh member and Chair. From 8 May 2017, the Interim Mayor will be replaced by the directly elected Mayor of Greater Manchester. The ten leaders (the elected Mayor in Salford) are members of the GMCA and will form the Mayor's cabinet whilst continuing to lead their own councils.

The Mayor will have various powers and responsibilities, including the fire service, transport, planning and housing and also those previously held by the Police and Crime Commissioner.

Decision Making

The Mayor will be able to make some decisions independently. Some of the Mayor's decisions will require consultation with and the approval of the GMCA. Certain decisions will be made by the GMCA and Mayor together.

Decisions will be subject to scrutiny by one or more overview and scrutiny committees made up of members of the ten Greater Manchester councils. A Police and Crime Panel will scrutinise those decisions of the Mayor which relate to Police and Crime Commissioner powers.

How is the Mayor elected?

The Mayor is elected using the Supplementary Voting system. This means that voters have the opportunity to choose their first and second choice candidate. This is different to the First Past the Post system used in local and parliamentary elections.

If one candidate gets more than half of the first choice votes, then they will be elected as the Mayor of Greater Manchester. If no candidate gets more than half of the first choice votes, then the two candidates with the most first choice votes go into a second round. All other candidates are eliminated. Any second choice votes from the eliminated candidates, which have been cast for the top two candidates remaining in the contest, will then be counted and added to their first choice. totals. The candidate who has the highest overall total will be declared the Mayor of Greater Manchester.

Completing your ballot paper

Please take time to read the instructions below which provide more information on how to complete your ballot paper.

- You have the opportunity to cast your vote for your first and second choice candidate
- Vote for your first choice candidate by putting a in the box in column A next to their name
- Vote for your second choice candidate by putting a in the box in column B next to their name
- For your second choice to be valid, it must be different to your first choice
- If you only mark a second choice, your vote will not be counted.

How you can vote

At your polling station

Before 4 May 2017, you should have received a poll card which includes the name and address of your polling station. You can only vote at the polling station stated on this card. You do not need to take the poll card with you in order to vote but it may save time if you do.

Applying to vote by post or proxy

Anyone who is registered to vote can apply to vote by post or appoint someone they trust to vote on their behalf as a proxy.

New applications for a postal vote must have been received by your Electoral Registration Office (for the local authority area in which you live) by 5.00pm on Tuesday 18 April 2017. If by the time you receive this candidate information booklet the postal vote application deadline has passed, there is still time to appoint someone you trust to vote on your behalf as a proxy.

The deadline for new applications for a proxy vote is 5.00pm on Tuesday 25 April 2017.

Where to get more information

To download application forms, go to www.yourvotematters.co.uk. Application forms must be returned to your Electoral Registration Office in the local authority area in which you live. Details of the ten Electoral Registration Offices in Greater Manchester can be found at the back of this booklet.

By post

If you are a registered postal voter, your postal vote will be sent to you around Friday 21 April 2017.

You should follow the instructions in the postal ballot pack very carefully. The ballot paper and the postal voting statement should be placed in the return envelopes as shown.

You must return your postal vote in the envelope provided so that it reaches your Electoral Registration Office by 10.00pm on Thursday 4 May 2017. If you miss the post, you can hand it in at your Electoral Registration Office at your local authority, or at any polling station in your local authority area before 10.00pm on Thursday 4 May 2017.

What to expect at the polling station

On Thursday 4 May 2017, polling stations will be open between 7.00am and 10.00pm for you to cast your vote.

When you arrive in the polling station, you will be asked for your name and address. Staff will check you are on the electoral register and then give you a ballot paper.

Additional support

The Combined Authority Returning Officer together with the Local Returning Officers in the ten local authority areas are committed to making sure that everybody who wants to vote can do so by providing the following:

- Polling stations which are accessible
- Tactile voting devices to enable voters with visual impairments to vote in person
- Large print versions of ballot papers
- The option of taking a companion (close relative or elector qualified to vote at the election) with you for assistance
- Trained polling station staff to provide assistance where required.

Multilingual resources

All voting materials in polling stations are in English. However, translations of key information will be available in Arabic, Bangla, Chinese, Czech, Farsi, Gujarati, Polish, Punjabi, Somali and Urdu.
