West Midlands Combined Authority Mayoral Election

On Thursday 4 May 2017, electors in the West Midlands Combined Authority area will have the opportunity to vote for the person they want to be Mayor for the Combined Authority until 2020.

The elected Mayor will have powers and responsibilities to make strategic decisions across the whole region. This is different to existing Civic Mayors (which are ceremonial mayors) and local council leaders who make decisions for, and on behalf of, their local authority.

About this booklet

This booklet must be sent to you by law*. It includes:

- information about the election
- an election address (i.e. a statement) from each of the Mayoral candidates who wish to be included
- information on how to fill in your ballot paper and how the result is calculated
- frequently asked questions.

Your vote is important in deciding who the future Mayor of the West Midlands Combined Authority is.



Mayoral Candidates

There are six candidates standing for the Mayor of the West Midlands Combined Authority. Election addresses from six of them appear in this booklet. All candidates are listed in alphabetical order below. This is the order in which they will appear on the ballot paper.

James BURN	Green Party
Pete DURNELL	UK Independence Party (UKIP)
Beverley Anne NIELSEN	Liberal Democrats
Siôn Llewelyn SIMON	Labour and Co-operative Party
Graham John STEVENSON	Communist
Andy STREET	The Conservative Party Candidate



Voting Information

Every registered elector will receive an official poll card which will explain when, where and how to vote. Details of your polling station can be found on your poll card or alternatively by contacting your local elections office.

How to cast your vote

When you get to the polling station, you will receive a ballot paper for the Mayoral election. Postal voters will have this ballot paper in their postal pack. This election uses the supplementary voting system. You will have two votes – one for your first choice candidate and one, if you wish, for your second choice candidate. The ballot paper will list all the candidates standing. Next to the list of candidates there will be two columns.

You will be asked to:

- Vote for your first choice candidate by marking a cross (x) in column A, and
- Vote for your second choice candidate by marking a cross (x) in column B.
- You should not mark more than one cross in column A, and you should not mark more than one cross in column B

- If you have marked a first choice, you can choose whether or not to mark a second choice.
- If you only mark a cross in the second choice column, your vote will not be counted.



Postal Voters

If you have registered for a postal vote, a pack will be delivered to your home from 18 April.

If you have not received it by 27 April, you should contact your local authority.

It is now too late to opt for a new postal vote for this election.

Follow the instructions in your postal vote pack, ensuring that you provide your signature and enter your date of birth on

the security statement that must be returned with your ballot papers.

Please ensure that your completed postal ballot papers and security statement are returned in the same envelope as soon as possible.

Your pack must be received by the Returning Officer for your local authority area by no later than 10pm on 4 May 2017.

Key Dates



Postal packs start to arrive. If you haven't received your pack by **27 April** please email or call your local authority elections team. Your Local Returning Officer must receive your postal vote by **10pm on 4 May** for it to be counted.



Last date for proxy vote request – if you are a registered voter and you wish to apply for a new application to vote by proxy (someone to vote on your behalf), you must do this before 5pm on 25 April.



Voting day – you can vote from **7am–10pm** in person at your local polling station, which may have changed and is detailed on your poll card. **Postal votes must be submitted by 10pm** and can be dropped off at a polling station in your local authority area if necessary.




Mayoral election count

Who is Elected?


All the first choices are counted, and if one candidate has received **more than 50%** of the votes they will be elected Mayor of the Combined Authority.




If no candidate has more than 50% of the vote, the two candidates with the most first choice votes will remain in the election and all other candidates will be eliminated.



Mayor of the West Midlands Combined Authority



The ballot papers for the **eliminated candidates** are then checked. Any second choice votes for the two remaining candidates are added to their first round totals. The candidate with the most votes wins.

Karren Brady talks to former John Lewis boss Andy Street about his West Midlands Renewal Plan

The West Midlands Mayor is a big job. Why are you, a businessman, the best person to do it?

The job is huge. It's too important to leave to the local political establishment that have failed to do enough for our region. The person who gets this job will control £8 billion of investment, transport, long term housing provision and potentially policing too. That's why it's so important that we have someone with the right experience, a clear plan and total commitment to the job to make a difference. I ran John Lewis for 9 years employing 30,000 people. 
