

METRO MAYOR LIVERPOOL CITY REGION

Introduction

On Thursday, 6th May 2021 electors across the Liverpool City Region, comprising the authorities of Halton, Knowsley, Liverpool, St. Helens, Sefton and Wirral will have the opportunity to vote for the person they want to be the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor. The City Region Mayor (also known as the Metro Mayor) will have a range of powers including strategic housing and planning, transport and highways, business growth, energy and environment and finance.

This booklet must be sent to you by law. The law also requires that a copy is sent to every individual registered elector rather than one per household.

The booklet includes information about the election and has in it an election address from each of the City Region Mayoral candidates who wish to be included. If you want more information about the candidates then you should contact them directly. You will also find information on how to fill in your ballot paper, how the result is calculated, together with answers to some frequently asked questions.

The booklet also sets out the contact details for each elections office where you live (see back of booklet). Further information can also be found at liverpoolcityregionelects.org

The Mayoral Candidates

There are 4 candidates standing for Mayor of the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority. All of these candidates requested that an election address from them be published in this booklet. All candidates are listed in alphabetical order below. This is the order in which they will appear on the ballot paper.

Gary Cargill - Green Party

Jade Marsden - The Conservative Party Candidate

David Newman - Liberal Democrats

Steve Rotheram - Labour Party

The order in which the addresses of candidates appear in this booklet has been determined by the drawing of lots by the Combined Authority Returning Officer.







How to Vote

As there are a number of elections taking place on 6th May, depending on where you live in the Liverpool City Region, you will receive either three or four ballot papers. Electors in Halton, Knowsley, St. Helens, Sefton and Wirral will receive three ballot papers and electors in Liverpool four.

- The YELLOW ballot paper is for the Combined Authority Mayoral election. You have two votes (for your first and second choice preference).
- The **GREEN** ballot paper is for the Police and Crime Commissioner election. You have two votes (for your first and second choice preference).
- The LILAC ballot paper is for the Liverpool Mayoral election (Liverpool City Council electors only). You have two votes (for your first and second choice preference).

For the above elections your first and second choices/preferences should be different.


• The **WHITE** ballot paper is for the local elections. Vote for no more than the number of candidates stated on the ballot paper.

At this election, you can have two votes on the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayoral ballot paper, one for your first choice candidate and one, if you wish, for your second choice candidate, (see across for further information).

You mark your choices with an 'X'.

If you wish to make a first and second choice vote, make sure you place an 'X' in both columns. DO NOT place both 'X' in one column as neither vote will count.









How The Votes are Counted

At Mayoral Elections, the supplementary voting system is used to count the number of votes cast. This is how it works:

- If one candidate gets more than 50% of the first choice votes, he or she will become the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor.
- If no candidate gets this majority, the two candidates with the most first choice votes will remain in the election and all other candidates are eliminated.
- The second choice votes for the eliminated candidates are then counted. Any votes for the two remaining candidates are added to their first choice totals.
- The candidate who then has the highest overall total of votes cast is declared the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor.



Q & A's The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority

What authorities does the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority cover?

The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority covers the local authority areas of Halton, Knowsley, Liverpool, St. Helens, Sefton and Wirral.

Why do we need a Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor?

Electing a Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor was part of the Devolution Agreement signed by the Government and the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority. As well as agreeing to a directly elected Mayor, the Devolution Agreement secured more than £900m of funding for the City Region over the next 30 years, as well as devolving decision making around key priorities to the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority.

The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor has responsibility (decision making and funding control) for a number of priority areas across the Liverpool City Region including: transport, employment and skills, business support, spatial planning, energy and environment and other areas.

The Combined Authority Mayor will also chair the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority, which takes control of the £900m of funding over a 30 year period.







Does the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor make decisions over my local Council / the services they provide?

No. Your local council will continue to provide the services needed and used by their local communities. The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor makes decisions that impact on and improve the Liverpool City Region. This includes transport improvements in your area, for example, but the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor is not responsible for Council services such as bin collections or setting Council Tax.

Q & A's – The Voting Process

1. Do I need to wear a face covering when going to my polling station?

Yes, you should wear a face covering when inside a polling station, unless you carry an exemption.

- 2. Should I bring my own pen or pencil to the polling station? Yes, if possible you should bring your own pen or pencil to mark your ballot papers. Pencils will still be available at the polling station, if you need them.
- 3. Will there be other Covid-19 safety measures in place? Yes, these include additional (and regular) cleaning of the polling station, the use of protective screens between staff and electors, the introduction of social distancing and queuing measures (which may result in electors having to wait outdoors if necessary) and access to hand sanitiser at polling stations for use by electors.
- 4. Why two votes for one Mayor? The law states the voting process for Mayoral Elections must be done this way. It allows you to say who would be your second choice for Mayor if your first does not win.





5. How do I mark my vote?

Mark your vote in the usual way, with a single X in each of the columns indicated. You have two votes, for your first and second choice of Liverpool City Region Mayor. This is also the voting process in the Police and Crime Commissioner Election and (if you come under Liverpool City Council) the Liverpool Mayoral Election. For Local Elections please read the information printed on your ballot papers before casting your vote.

- 6. What happens if I don't make a second choice? Your first choice vote will still be counted.
- 7. I don't really like any of the candidates. What happens if I only mark an X in the second choice column? Your vote will NOT be counted because it is not possible to identify who was your preferred candidate.
- 8. What if I mark an X in the first choice column for more than one candidate?

Your vote will not be counted because it is not possible to identify which was your preferred candidate. If you wish to use both of your votes, then you must mark an X in column A for your first choice candidate and also in column B for your second choice candidate.

9. What if I put 1 and 2 on the Mayoral ballot paper for my first and second choice?

Your vote may not be counted because it is not clear what you mean. You should mark your votes with an X.

10. I have a question about this election. Who should I contact?

If your question is about how the election is being organised, please contact your local Elections office, (contact details are shown at the end of this booklet). If your question is about the candidates and their election address, you should contact the candidates themselves.

11. When will Polling Stations be open?

Polling Stations will be open from 7am - 10pm. The location of your polling station is printed on your poll card, which will be delivered separately.

12. Why has every voter in the household been sent a booklet? It seems to be a waste of money.

The law says that everyone registered must be sent their own copy so that they get a chance to see the booklet, who is standing for election and what the candidates are saying.

13. I have lost my poll card. Can you send me another one? You do not need the poll card to vote, so another one won't be sent. The poll card is just to inform you that there is an election and to provide you with other information such as where your polling station is situated. If you are not sure where your polling station is, please contact your local Electoral Services office (contact details are shown at the end of this booklet) and they will assist you.





Postal Voters

If you are a postal voter, please ensure that your completed postal ballot papers are returned as soon as possible. If you have not received your postal ballot paper by Friday 30th April, call your own local authority Elections helpline (details at the end of this booklet). It is important that you follow the instructions sent with your postal pack ensuring that you provide your signature and enter your date of birth on the security statement that you return with your ballot papers. This is to ensure that nobody else uses your vote.



The Candidates

Please note that the content of each of the following pages relating to candidates is the responsibility of the candidate themselves. The views expressed are theirs alone and cannot be attributed to the Combined Authority Returning Officer or any of the Combined Authority City Region councils. The order in which the addresses of the candidates appear in this booklet has been determined by the drawing of lots by the Combined Authority Returning Officer.
