Introduction

On Thursday 2 May 2024 there will be an election for a Mayor of the Tees Valley Combined Authority.

People who are registered to vote in local elections for any of the constituent councils Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar & Cleveland or Stockton-on-Tees are eligible to vote in this election.

I am required by law to send this booklet to every person entitled to vote at the election. It includes election addresses from Mayoral Candidates. You will also find information about how to fill in your ballot paper and how we calculate the result.

There are three candidates standing in the election for a Mayor of the Tees Valley Combined Authority. They will be listed alphabetically on the yellow ballot paper.

Each candidate was given the chance to put an election address in this booklet. Three candidates chose to do so, and each candidate was required to pay £885 towards the booklet's cost. Lots were drawn to decide the order in which the election addresses appear in the booklet.

What does the Mayor do?

The Mayor works alongside the five Tees Valley Local Authorities to drive economic growth, create jobs and transform Tees Valley. The Mayor has responsibilities and influence over:

Transport

Improve and invest in our region's transport network, including roads, rail and air

Education, employment and skills

Improve and promote education and skills, career and work opportunities for young people and adults

Business Growth & Investment

Encourage inward investment and the creation of jobs in the region, and support its businesses to help them grow

Place & Communities

Invest in place to develop our region's town centres, communities and industrial areas

Culture and Tourism

Promote culture and tourism in the region

Devolution

Continue to secure funding and powers from central Government

Chair of the Hartlepool Development Corporation

Middlesbrough Development Corporation

Chair of the Middlesbrough Development Corporation

South Tees Development Corporation

What is the Tees Valley?

Tees Valley describes the area covering Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar & Cleveland and Stockton-on-Tees.

The five councils have been working in partnership for over 25 years, however the individual identities of the separate towns and communities remain important.

What is the Tees Valley Combined Authority?

The Combined Authority is a body, set up by law to lead the economic development of Tees Valley which is chaired by an elected Mayor. It is a partnership of five authorities; Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar & Cleveland and Stockton-on-Tees, working closely with the business community and other partners to make local decisions to support the growth of the economy. An elected Tees Valley Mayor and Combined Authority deliver powers and responsibilities previously carried out by central Government.

The Tees Valley Combined Authority is part of a group which also includes the Hartlepool Development Corporation, Middlesbrough Development Corporation, South Tees Development Corporation and Teesside International Airport.

What are Mayoral Development Corporations?

South Tees Development Corporation is charged with overseeing the regeneration of Teesworks, the 4,500-acre industrial zone south of the river Tees, while Hartlepool and Middlesbrough Development Corporations have been formed with the goal of transforming the town centres through driving investment.

What is the difference between the Combined Authority and local councils?

Local councils are responsible for delivering local services, such as children's services, social care, refuse collection, libraries, street cleaning, etc.

The Tees Valley Combined Authority is focused on the economic growth of the wider Tees Valley. Its powers and funding come from central Government, not from local councils.

Why do we have a Tees Valley Mayor?

In 2015, local council leaders agreed a devolution deal with ministers to transfer powers, funding and responsibilities from central Government to our local area. The Government said that this was only possible if an elected Mayor is publicly accountable for decisions; working alongside the existing councils and other partners.

How the mayor is elected

In the Election for a Mayor of the Tees Valley Combined Authority on 2 May 2024, there are three candidates and you have one vote. The candidate who receives the most votes will be elected.

How You Can Vote

Vote for a candidate using your yellow ballot paper

- You have three choices for Mayor
- Vote for only one candidate by putting a cross in the box next to your choice

Where You Can Vote

At your polling station

Before 2 May 2024 you will be sent a poll card which includes details of where your polling station is. You do not need to take the poll card with you to vote (unless you are an anonymous elector), but it will help staff. You can only vote at the polling station stated on this card. You will need to show appropriate photographic ID to be able to vote at a polling station. For more information please visit electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID If you do not have any of the documents listed, you can apply for a voter authority certificate at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk The deadline for Voter Authority Certificate applications is 5pm on 24 April 2024 to be able to use it in this election.



By Post

If you wish to apply to vote by post, you can apply at www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote. Complete the online form fully. If you don't have internet access, your local Electoral Services Office can help.

New applications for a postal vote must be completed by 5pm on Wednesday 17 April 2024.

If you are a registered postal voter, your ballot paper will be sent to you about two weeks before polling day. You must post it in the envelope provided so that it is delivered to your Electoral Services Office by 10pm on 2 May 2024.

If you have not posted your ballot paper and postal voting statement in time, you can deliver it by hand on polling day. You can hand in your own postal pack and up to 5 others, on completion of a form. This can be at any polling station in your electoral area or to your Electoral Services Office. You should follow the instructions in the postal ballot pack carefully.

By Proxy

If you are registered to vote but are unable to get to the polling station on polling day 2 May 2024, you can appoint someone you trust to vote on your behalf. If you would like to vote by proxy, your completed application form must be received by your local Electoral Services Office no later than 5pm on Wednesday 24 April 2024. You can apply at www.gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote. Complete the online form fully. If you don't have internet access, your local Electoral Services Office can help.

The person you appoint as a proxy must be over 18 years, be registered to vote at this election and must not be a proxy for more than four electors, no more than two of which can be registered in the UK.

If you have applied to have someone vote on your behalf (Proxy), make sure that they know the candidate you wish to vote for.



What to expect at the polling station

On 2 May 2024 your local polling station is open between 7am and 10pm for you to cast your vote.

You should aim to arrive at the polling station in plenty of time. By law, if you are not in the polling station or in a queue outside waiting for your ballot paper by 10pm, you won't be able to vote. When you arrive at the polling station you will be asked for your name, address and photographic identification. Staff will check you are on the register and then give you a ballot paper. They can help you understand how to fill it out too.

Additional Support

There are 'tactile voting devices' and large print versions of the ballot paper at all polling stations to help people with visual impairments. Polling station staff are trained and will be able to offer additional assistance to voters.

Outside the Polling Station

Supporters of the candidates (called "Tellers") may stand outside the polling station and ask you your name and address. Tellers help their parties to identify supporters who haven't yet voted. That way, those that haven't voted can be contacted and encouraged to vote. You don't have to speak to tellers if you don't want to.

My Plan for Tees Valley



Bring back free parking to breathe life into struggling town centres

I'll bring back free town centre parking to help families that are struggling with the Conservative cost of living crisis. I'll give councils more money to support small businesses.

Introduce a £2 fare cap on trains and buses
