#### Introduction

On **Thursday, 2nd May 2024,** electors across the Liverpool City Region, comprising the authorities of: Halton, Knowsley, Liverpool, St. Helens, Sefton and Wirral will have the opportunity to vote for the person they want to be the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority Mayor.

The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority has powers that include housing, regeneration, adult education and skills, strategic planning, culture and economic development. It has transport responsibilities that include Mersey Tunnels, Mersey Ferries, and also certain rail, highways, cycling and walking provision. The office of the elected Mayor also has certain powers over bus services. The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority makes investments in transport, business growth, energy efficiency, housing, environmental and cultural activities.









The Elected Mayor of the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority (also known as the City Region Mayor, or Metro Mayor) will lead the Combined Authority.

This booklet must be sent to you by law. The law also requires that a copy is sent to every individual registered elector, rather than one per household.

The booklet includes information about the election and has in it an election address from each of the City Region Mayoral candidates who wish to be included. If you want more information about the candidates then you should contact them directly. You will also find information on how to fill in your ballot paper, how the result is calculated, together with answers to some frequently asked questions.

The booklet also sets out the contact details for each Elections Office where you live (see end of booklet). Further information can also be found at **liverpoolcityregionelects.org** 

#### The Mayoral Candidates

There are 5 candidates standing for City Region Mayor. Any candidate who has requested to have their information published will appear in this booklet. All candidates are listed in alphabetical order below. This is the order in which they will appear on the ballot paper.

Rob McAllister Bell Liberal Democrats

Steve Rotheram Labour Party

The order in which the addresses of candidates appear in this booklet has been determined by the drawing of lots by the Combined Authority Returning Officer.







#### How to Vote

As there are a number of elections taking place on Thursday 2nd May, depending on where you live in the Liverpool City Region, you will receive either two, three, or potentially four ballot papers.

Electors in Liverpool, St Helens and Wirral, will receive two ballot papers for the Combined Authority Mayoral and Police and Crime Commissioner elections.

Electors in Sefton and Knowsley will receive three ballot papers for the Combined Authority Mayoral, Police and Crime Commissioner and local elections.

Most electors in Halton will receive three ballot papers. However, in a small number of areas that have contested parish elections, you will receive up to four ballot papers, for the Combined Authority Mayoral, Police and Crime Commissioner, and local and parish elections. Please note only areas with contested parish elections will receive four ballot papers and in the vast majority of cases, electors in Halton will just receive 3 ballot papers.

- The YELLOW ballot paper is for the Combined Authority Mayoral election. In the Mayoral Election you can only vote for one candidate by placing an X in the box next to your choice.
- The GREEN ballot paper is for the Police and Crime Commissioner election.
- For local elections, if you live in Knowsley or Sefton your ballot paper for the local election will be SALMON coloured. If you live in Halton, then your ballot paper for the local election will be IVORY coloured.

There are no local council elections taking place in Liverpool, St Helens and Wirral on 2nd May.

#### Frequently Asked Questions

## Which authorities does the Liverpool City Region Combined Authority cover?

The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority covers the local authority areas of Halton, Knowsley, Liverpool, St. Helens, Sefton and Wirral.

#### What is the role of the City Region Mayor?

The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority brings together the local authority areas of Halton, Knowsley, Liverpool, Sefton, St Helens and Wirral who work collectively as a Combined Authority. With a population of around 1.6 million residents, the City Region sits within a wider regional economy of around 3 million people in a travel to work area that stretches throughout the North West and North Wales.

#### The Elected Mayor will

- Promote and support economic growth within the City Region;
- Lead the delivery of unique devolution deals negotiated with government which cover areas such as employment and skills, housing and planning, transport, innovation, business growth and support, energy and culture;
- Drive prosperity and encourages innovation to expand opportunities for people and communities in every part of the city region;
- Work with stakeholders from across the City Region and beyond, particularly business and investors and has a key role in representing the City Region nationally and internationally;
- Ensure political accountability of the Combined Authority area.

The Elected Mayor will be responsible for the delivery of a revenue budget of around £280 million a year and a capital investment programme of over £1 billion. This funding will support many significant projects across the region and includes responsibility for transport across the city region, (which includes the Mersey Tunnels), Mersey Ferries and Merseyrail. In future years this role will also expand into greater levels of direct control over bus services in the city region.

## Does the City Region Mayor make decisions over my local Council/the services they provide?

No. Your local council will continue to provide the services needed and used by their local communities. The City Region Mayor will make decisions that impact on and improve the Liverpool City Region. This includes transport improvements in your area, for example, but the City Region Mayor is not responsible for Council services, such as bin collections, or setting Council Tax.







#### Q & A's – The Voting Process

#### 1. Do I need to take photographic ID to my polling station?

Yes. All electors must show an accepted form of photo ID before being provided with ballot papers. A full list of acceptable ID is shown on the reverse of your poll card, or at **electoralcommission.org.uk** 

#### 2. I don't have an accepted form of ID, what can I do?

You can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate, at


or alternatively contact your local authority (details at the end of the booklet) and they will send you a paper copy.

Please note completed applications must be received at the relevant authority by no later than 5pm on Wednesday 24 April. Please apply as early as possible to ensure you receive your certificate in plenty of time.

#### 3. Is my locally issued bus pass an accepted form of voter ID?

No. Unfortunately, the law only allows for a national bus pass to be used. A locally issued bus pass WILL NOT be accepted as voter ID.









#### 4. How do I mark my ballot paper to cast my vote?

For the Combined Authority Mayoral and Police and Crime Commissioner elections, vote for only one candidate by placing an 'X' in the box next to your choice. For local elections (Halton, Knowsley and Sefton) vote for no more than the number of candidates stated on your ballot paper by marking an 'X' in the box next to your choice(s).

#### 5. I have a question about this election. Who should I contact?

If your question is about how the election is being organised, please contact your local Elections Office, (contact details are shown at the end of this booklet). If your question is about the candidates and their election address, you should contact the candidates themselves.

#### 6. When will Polling Stations be open?

Polling Stations will be open from 7am - 10pm. The location of your polling station is printed on your poll card, which will be delivered separately. Alternatively visit **democracyclub.org.uk** 

#### 7. Why has every voter in the household been sent a booklet?

The law says that everyone registered must be sent their own copy so that they get a chance to see the booklet, who is standing for election and what the candidates are saying.







#### 8. I have lost my poll card. Can you send me another one?

You do not need the poll card to vote, so another one won't be sent. The poll card is just to inform you that there is an election and to provide you with other information such as where your polling station is situated. If you are not sure where your polling station is, please contact your local Electoral Services Office (contact details are shown at the end of this booklet) and they will assist you or alternatively visit:

#### 9. When will I know who has been elected?

Each authority will count the votes for each candidate in their own area and the results provided to the Combined Authority who will calculate an overall result. Due to the number of elections taking place on 2nd May, the Combined Authority Mayoral election count will take place on Saturday 4th May and the result will be available around 1pm on this date. Please visit **Liverpoolcityregionelections.org** and the result will be announced here once available.

#### 10. I can't get to my polling station on election day, what can I do?

The deadline to apply for a postal vote is 5pm on 17th April (as stated on your poll card). If this deadline has passed you can apply for a proxy vote at **gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote** The deadline to apply for a proxy vote is 5pm on 24th April, and completed applications must be received by then.


#### **Postal Voters**



If you are a postal voter, please ensure that your completed postal ballot papers are returned as soon as possible. If you have not received your postal ballot paper by **Friday 26th April**, call your own local authority Elections helpline (details at the end of this booklet). It is important that you follow the instructions sent with your postal pack, ensuring that you provide your **signature** and enter your **date of birth** on the security statement that you return with your ballot papers. This is to ensure that nobody else uses your vote.

Please be aware that if you forget to put your postal vote in a post box, then you can hand it in at a polling station on election day, or at the offices of the Local Returning Officer for your authority. Recent changes in legislation require you to complete a declaration, at the point when you hand your postal vote in at a polling station or council offices.

Please ensure you complete and return your postal pack as soon as possible.


