
Election of Mayor for the West Midlands Combined Authority Area

West Midlands Combined Authority Mayoral Election

On Thursday 2 May 2024, electors in the West Midlands Combined Authority Area¹ will have the opportunity to vote for the person they want to be Mayor until 2028.

What does the Mayor do?

The West Midlands Combined Authority (WMCA) was established in 2016 and consists of the seven constituent authorities Birmingham, Coventry, Dudley, Sandwell, Solihull, Walsall and Wolverhampton. Each of the constituent authorities appoints two of its elected members as a member of the WMCA.

The Mayor chairs the Combined Authority Board and has various powers and responsibilities, including transport, regeneration, economic development and acts as an ambassador for the area.

About this booklet

This booklet must be sent to you by law². It includes:

- information about the election.
- an Election Address (i.e. a statement) from each of the Mayoral candidates who wish to be included.
- information on how you can vote, how to complete your ballot paper, voter ID requirements and what to expect at your polling station.
- frequently asked questions.

Your vote will be important in deciding who is the future Mayor for the West Midlands Combined Authority area.

Mayoral Candidates

There are 6 candidates standing for the Mayor of the West Midlands Combined Authority. Election Addresses from 5 of them appear in this booklet. All candidates are listed in alphabetical order below. This is the order in which they will appear on the ballot paper.

Voting

Every registered elector will receive an official poll card which will explain when, where and how to vote. Details of your polling station can be found on your poll card, on your local council's website or alternatively by contacting your local elections office. Polling stations will be open between 7am and 10pm. You do not need to take your poll card with you. However, you will be required to show an accepted form of Voter ID when voting in a polling station.

How to cast your vote

You must vote for ONE candidate only, by putting a cross in the box next to the candidate of your choice. Put no other mark on the ballot paper or your vote may not be counted.

If you are a registered elector, you will • The Local ballot paper will be either receive up to three ballot papers.

- One is for the Local Elections
- One is for the Mayoral Election
- One is for the Police and Crime Commissioner
- LILAC OR SALMON.
- The Mayoral ballot paper will be YELLOW.
- The Police & Crime Commissioner ballot paper will be GREEN.

Postal Voters

If you have registered for a postal vote, a pack will be delivered to your home after **17 April**.

If you have not received it by **26 April**, you should contact your local authority. It is now too late to opt for a new postal vote for this election.

Follow the instructions in your postal vote pack, ensuring that you provide your signature and enter your date of birth on the security statement that must be returned with your ballot papers.

Please ensure that your completed postal ballot papers and security statement are returned in the same envelope as soon as possible. Your pack must be received by the Local Returning Officer by no later than 10pm on 2 May 2024. If you take your postal pack to the local council offices' or a polling station in your area, please ensure that you hand it to a member of staff who will get you to complete a postal vote return form. Do not place your postal vote in the council offices letter box as this may result in your vote not being counted.

Key Dates



Postal Packs start to arrive. If you haven't received your pack by **26 April** please email or call your local authority elections team. Your Local Returning Officer must receive your postal vote by 10pm on 2 May for it to be counted.



Last date for proxy vote request – If you are a registered voter and you wish to apply for a new application to vote by proxy (someone to vote on your behalf).

Last date to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate - if you require an accepted form of ID. The deadline for both is 5pm on 24 April.



Voting day – You can vote from **7am–10pm** in person at your local polling station, which may have changed and is detailed on your poll card. You will be required to show an accepted form of Voter ID to receive a ballot paper in the polling station.

Postal votes must be submitted by **10pm** and can be dropped off at a polling station in your local authority area if necessary.

Dear Resident,

My name is Elaine Williams and I am Reform UK's candidate to become the next West Midlands Metro Mayor. I am a solicitor and I care passionately about our people and our quality of life. My key priorities for our region are employment, health, wellbeing and social care, transport, crime, the environment, and you.

Like you, I want our region to be a first-class place to live and work, but our elected representatives have failed us, and we deserve better.

Business: Local businesses are being severely affected by the introduction of 'Low Traffic Neighbourhood schemes', 'Clean Air Zones', imposed road closures and arbitrary traffic restrictions, all of which reduce public access to their businesses. These schemes also make travel around our towns and cities unnecessarily difficult. I will change these detrimental measures, invest in our town centres and revitalise our high streets to allow our businesses to flourish and thrive, and seek to encourage more businesses to invest in the West Midlands.

Net Zero, the Environment and Pollution: Much is spoken about the drive to Net Zero and the negative impact of pollution on the environment. Energy policies pursued across the region are making everyone poorer and colder as a result of soaring fuel prices and green energy levies inflating our energy costs. West Midlands water companies discharged untreated sewage into our waterways over 60,000 times during 2023, a 54% increase in the number of sewage spills over 2020-2022. Measures must be taken to stop this practice, clean up our rivers and waterways and prosecute offenders. Excessive shareholder profit-taking must be stopped, and the money invested into reducing leaks, developing the water infrastructure, and combating pollution.

Transport: As predicted, HS2 has proved to be the white elephant we all thought it would be. It was heralded as the stimulus for transport and travel in the West Midlands, but has failed to deliver any tangible benefits, leaving a trail of destruction and devastation to the countryside in its wake. Instead of vanity projects, we need a complete rethink on travel to deliver a fully integrated, efficient, safer and more effective transport system for the West Midlands.

Crime: Crime is on the increase, particularly violent crime, with the West Midlands being one of the highest crime areas in the country. More measures are needed, as well as an increase in police officers on the ground. Working in partnership with the seven local authorities and the Police and Crime Commissioner, I will bid for additional funding to address these urgent needs.


Health and Wellbeing: Levels of care and access to services should be equally available to all. One of the most pressing issues is mental health, where levels of service and support vary dramatically across the region. I want to ensure that everyone has access to the services they need, including GP Practices. I will work closely with the NHS and Social Care providers to make this a reality.

Social Housing: There are too many homes in the region where significant repairs are outstanding, and many properties are affected by black mould and other environmental health threats. I will introduce stringent checks to ensure that existing tenants are living in decent accommodation, and work with Housing Associations to build more affordable homes. There are many former brownfield industrial sites that can be recovered for housing, reducing the need to build on Green Belt land. I will also work with industry to repurpose buildings that are no longer in use, which can be converted into housing accommodation and training centres for the homeless and our service veterans.

If elected as your mayor, your hopes, your needs, and your concerns will be my highest priorities. I will act in the best interests of everyone living in the West Midlands Combined Authority region.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is a directly elected Combined Authority Mayor?

The directly elected Mayor chairs the West Midlands Combined Authority (WMCA) Board and is elected by the residents of the West Midlands Combined Authority area.

The West Midlands Combined Authority (WMCA) is made up of seven constituent authorities – Birmingham, Coventry, Dudley, Sandwell, Solihull, Walsall and Wolverhampton.

Why does the West Midlands Combined Authority Area have an elected Mayor?

The Mayor, in partnership with the Combined Authority, exercises the powers and functions devolved from Government set out in the West Midlands devolution deal.

More devolution means greater accountability and the role of Mayor helps to ensure that there is clear accountability over existing and future devolved functions and funding from the national to the local level.

A key part of the role is to act as an advocate and global ambassador for the West Midlands Combined Authority area and to chair the West Midlands Combined Authority (WMCA) Board.

What is devolution?

England is one of the most centralised countries in the developed world. Devolution is a process that transfers powers and funding from central Government to a local area.

It means decisions can be made closer to the people affected, involving them more directly.

What powers does the Mayor have?

The Mayor leads the Combined Authority, working with partner authorities and stakeholders, and chairs the WMCA Board. The main functions of the authority relate to transport, housing, regeneration, employment and skills, economic and industrial strategy, investment and public service reform.

As the devolution agenda develops so the role of the Mayor is also expected to evolve, working with Combined Authority colleagues to deliver the best possible outcomes for the residents and businesses of the West Midlands.

The Mayor and the Combined Authority work with partners and central government to identify powers and functions that could be better exercised locally, in addition to those already devolved, with the overall aim of embedding inclusive growth across the West Midlands area.

How do I mark my vote?

Mark your vote in the usual way, with a single **x** in the box next to the candidate you wish to vote for.

When will the polling stations be open?

Polling stations will be open on 2 May 2024 from 7am–10pm. The location of your polling station is printed on your poll card. This may have changed since the last time you voted, so please look carefully at your poll card.

Please remember to take an accepted form of Voter ID with you to the polling station. You can find out more information about what ID is acceptable on the Electoral Commission's website – www. electoralcommission.org.uk

For help finding or identifying your polling station, please call your local authority's elections helpline or visit www.wmcaelects.co.uk.

Why has every voter in the household been sent a booklet? It seems to be a waste of money.

The law says that everyone registered to vote must be sent their own copy so that they get a chance to see the booklet, who is standing for election and what the candidates are saying.

I have not received any information on the candidates standing in the other elections.

Through this booklet you have received information on the West Midlands Combined Authority Mayoral candidates, as we are required to send this to you by law.

For local elections, it is the decision and responsibility of the candidate or their agent to provide and send out further information to you.

What is an accepted form of Voter ID?

There is a whole list of documents which can be used as an accepted form of Voter ID eg passport, driving licence, older person's bus pass. You can find a full list on your poll card or the Electoral Commission's website. If you do not have an accepted form of Voter ID you can apply for a free voter authority certificate online or by contacting your local elections office.

Will there be any additional support at polling stations for people with disabilities?

The Returning Officers across the seven authorities in the West Midlands area are committed to supporting electors in exercising their vote. Additional support and equipment is provided at polling stations. For more information visit: www.wmcaelects.co.uk.
